While we don't want to promote natural gas as "the best" energy source, there are many unique advantages:

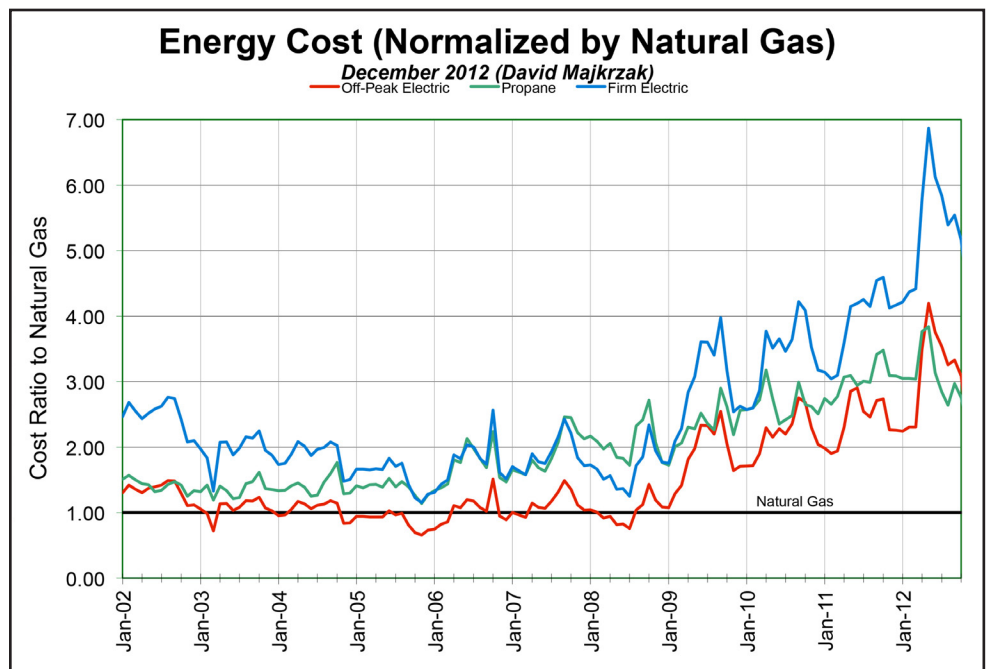
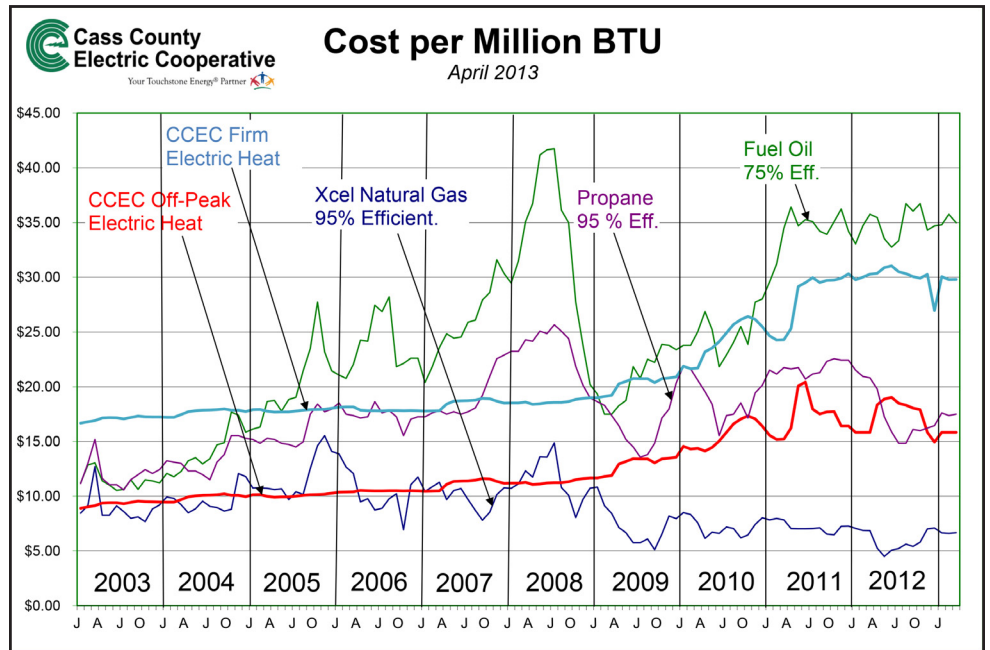
- 3 to 6 times less expensive than other energy sources

The graph to the right shows the dramatic increases in our primary energy options today. This shows how natural gas cost has remained a relatively constant cost for many years compared to how much the other energy sources have risen by comparison.
